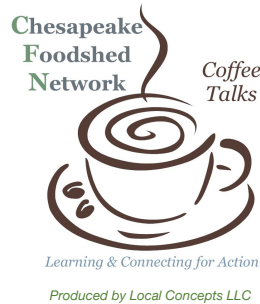

Nicole Civita is the Director of the Food Recovery Project and an Affiliated Professor with the University of Arkansas School of Law's LL.M. Program in Agricultural & Food Law. The Food Recovery Project educates stakeholders on the legal dimensions of food recovery and proposes strategic policy reforms. Nicole is also the Assistant Director of the Rian Fried Center for Sustainable Agriculture & Food Systems and Faculty in Sustainable Food Systems at Sterling College. Using a multidisciplinary approach that bridges legal expertise with hands-in-the-soil agricultural practice, Nicole's academic work focuses on developing full-scope policy solutions to the challenges facing our food system; she





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inspires her students to create the food-future they wish to see by doing the same. Nicole is a frequent speaker on the subjects of food conservation, food justice, community food security, planning for place-based food, and the power and limits of a market-based food movement. She holds an LL.M. in agricultural and food law from the University of Arkansas School of Law, a JD from the Georgetown University Law Center, and an AB from Columbia University.
